



The Armchair Economist: Economics and Everyday Life

In *The Armchair Economist*, Steven E. Landsburg shows how economic thinking illuminates the entire range of human behavior. But instead of focusing on the workings of financial markets, international trade, and other topics distant from the experience of most readers, Landsburg mines the details of daily life to reveal what the laws of economics tell us about ourselves. As Landsburg shows, some behavior that strikes most people as utterly unremarkable is quite extraordinary when seen through economists eyes. Why, for example, does popcorn cost so much at the movie theater? The obvious answer is that the theater owner has a monopoly.
